

Partnership with Council

What's growing? *Cassine crocea* (African Holly)

The National Trust's Register of Significant Trees lists three species from the Camperdown Botanic Gardens and Arboretum. This one, which can be found growing near the old potting shed, is *Cassine crocea* (sometimes known as *Eleodendron croceum*).

Originally classified as a holly (hence the common name), this tree from southern Africa is uncommon in Australian gardens and listed as rare and endangered in its natural habitat.

Evergreen with dark green leathery leaves, its most striking characteristic is the yellow bark, from which it takes the second part of its name 'croceum', meaning yellow like a crocus.


